In the Control center, you will see demonstrations of the various tools used in daily system operations: supervisory control, communications, lightning location, and fault analysis. Visit the electric vehicle area at Georgia Power. This electric transportation program began in 1992. The program was furthered in 1993 with the opening of the Electric Vehicle Research Center. This center was the electric utility industry's first facility dedicated exclusively to electric vehicle research.





The Tullie Smith House, which adjoins the Swan House, is one of the few extant pre-Civil War houses in Atlanta. The house, complete with live animals, authentically depicts the daily life of farming people in early inland Georgia.

Lunch will be a southern affair at The Blue Willow Inn, located about 20 minutes away in Social Circle. After lunch, guests can stroll down the main street of Social Circle, visiting the many gift and collectibles shops, some of which offer a unique collection of handmade gifts from local artists.

Atlanta's Masterpieces of Art and Nature

The masterpieces in the High Museum of Art are surrounded by another masterpiece, the building itself. Housing a renowned collection of fine art, this dazzling white landmark is the centerpiece of Atlanta's midtown arts district. After lunch at Coohill's, one of midtown's outstanding restaurants, guests will experience the beauty of the Atlanta Botanical Gardens. You'll visit the Dorothy Chapman Fuqua Conservatory, a 16,000 square-foot facility that features tropical, desert, Mediterranean, and endangered plants from around the world, all under one glass roof.
